

Dear Friends, March 2022

The wind blows still!

"The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes" John 3:8

I could use the same scripture as prompted by my letter last month. What with Storms Eunice and Franklin, the winds have been blowing wherever they will and causing all sorts of upsets and disruptions.

I have just postponed a meeting due to the railway cancellations. Yesterday, after morning worship Gillian and I, with assistance from our neighbour were cutting the stumps and branches of a tree from the manse garden that had fallen onto that same neighbour's shed. Do not worry there was no damage, or costs. But we must get the tree surgeons in to cutback the tall trees before any further damage is caused. The quotes have been presented to church meeting.

Whilst some trees have been brought down by the high winds, it is extraordinary how so many remain standing. It could be their sheer weight and solidity. But watching these trees blow to and fro, it is perhaps the "give" in the branches and the flexibility of tree trunks that provides its strength. A feat of Gods engineering.

There are human feats of engineering of course that model this flexibility to withstand high winds and storms. Even in the devastation of these past few days. Watching an airplane land in high winds it is possible to witness the flexibility built into the wings. Tall buildings of concrete and steel are designed to sway in winds lest the rigidity from the gusts rupture and crack the structure. Bridges may have been closed in various parts of the country, but it is from their weakness that their strength lies.

As you may remember, on a recent holiday in Norfolk, Gillian and I visited Norwich. There one medieval bridge survives. Bishop Bridge spans the river Winshum, dates from 1340 and as far as I can ascertain, survives the storms again. We could wander over this bridge. It is an arch bridge. Leonardo da Vinci's definition of an arch is the clue to this bridge's enduring strength. "An arch is nothing else than strength caused by two weaknesses; the arch is made of two segments of a circle, and as each being itself very weak desires to fall, and one withstands the fall of the other, the two weaknesses are converted into a single strength."

Now some trees have fallen and caused damage. The spire of St Thomas Church in Wells did topple and plunge to the ground. But perhaps in the feats of God's creation, and human engineering there is something to teach us about conflict and tension.

One of Paul's most paradoxical claims was that "when I am weak then I am strong". ("Corinthians 12; 10) where there is stress, conflict, tension, it is the time to show some flexibility. It has been said, the rigid and inflexible rarely help to share the load.

Think also of the illustration from suspension bridges. A parable in themselves. As traffic moves over the structure the weight is transferred to the cables which pass through the towers to the ground.

People we admire most are not usually those with no give in them or appreciate needs of others. It is no surprise Paul told the Romans to bear the weakness of those without strength. The Romans built many arches! Could they not learn from their own building strategies the lessons for life?

The storms over these past few days have brought tragedy and disruption. We pray for strength for those who have been forced to move or lost homes and property. We pray for comfort for those who have lost loved ones. My postponed meeting and fear for our neighbours shed are of little consequence in comparison.

On Sunday, in morning service I reflected a little on building bridges in fractured relationships and irreconcilable differences. Watching these storms, the wind blowing where it will, the force of the metaphor of these human feats of engineering in our life's conflicts and fractured moments are worth thinking about. A way of turning our weaknesses into strengths.
