#### From our Minister

## Dear Friends,

## Psalm 46 - Stand by Me

The first three notes of the typical bass guitar triad, struck up loudly and we immediately recognised the soul classic song, Stand By Me.

Several of us had gone along to the music and poetry concert at The Corner House, Surbiton last week. The Christian music legend from the 70s and 80s, but still writing, Bryn Haworth along with the poet (well known to me as Christian poet Stewart Henderson) and his wife Carol were performing.

Bryn Haworth is a brilliant slide guitarist and effortlessly holds an audience with a variety of styles of music from soul and blues to Rock and Roll. As a teenager I remember seeing him on stage with his band and buying his albums. So, it was a delight to sit close-up in this intimate venue and watch and listen to him play.

Stand by Me, is a classic soul song by Ben E King, the king of the bass triads (listen to this song and you will recognise it immediately) written 60 years ago, covered over four hundred times, including by John Lennon, and used countless times at weddings most famously, and ironically, at the wedding of the then Prince Harry and Megan Markle at St George's Chapel in 2018. There is also a great tube video of a street performer, saying, "a singer asks if I know Stand by Me" and they perform an impromptu rendition on the pavement. "It steals the show," he says.

I have played Stand by Me, and those bass triads dozens of times, but for some reason I had not realised what Bryn told us that night at the concert that this classic song contains words of Psalm 46.

So, I went to Psalm 46 for reflection. Well, to make the link with a great soul classic and scripture!

The last three years have brought enormous grief, anxiety, and uncertainty. Whatever we think about the pandemic, what we were told or how it was managed we cannot help but think about six million deaths worldwide. We continue to face political challenges not just in the UK. We watch the horrors of Ukraine and its destabilising effects on the economy. We feel helpless at acts of racial injustice, too numerous to count and the contentious global climate change. And then we face our own personal turmoil's and struggles.

Psalm 46 does not provide such a list of specific crises. It was referring to the city of Jerusalem with its own political strife as well as other natural and human made disasters. But we can turn to such a Psalm, "though the mountains shake, and the waters roar. Though the mountains tremble we will not fear. God is our refuge and strength". (para) Psalm 46 2 & 3. And such a song Or "if the sky that we look upon, should tumble and fall and the mountains should crumble into the sea, I won't cry if you stand by me." Stand by Me, Ben E King.

In Psalm 46, far from eliciting fear, this chaos gave Israel an opportunity to celebrate Gods presence, strength, and help. Far from eliciting tears, Stand by Me celebrates "standing by" our loved ones in such crises.

Ben E Kings song was drawn from an earlier gospel hit, Stand by me Father by the Soul Stirrers. So, the "new" Ben E King Stand By Me can be said to be a call to God to stand by each of us. But this song in the "Outro" lines, are "whenever you're in trouble won't you stand by me", indicating a mutuality of need for us as we stand by one another. Yet I am sure God's heart is also gladdened when we stand alongside God.

As far as the Psalm 46 is concerned, like the song there are no answers provided to the chaos of the world or the hurts and challenges of life's struggles. Verse 9 speaks of God making wars cease. And what about the massive natural disasters? It is quite natural to ask the questions, like those of the psalmists, where is God in the Tsunami?

We naturally wish to dispense with any notion of divine intervention causing such horrors, even though as Christians we affirm God's transcendent governance of all things. Scripture often records God sovereignly acting in the natural order. We are also increasingly aware of the profound human impact of the human community. It is difficult to separate the sphere of human activity from the workings of nature.

The conversation in the Psalm and the song is not to despair, but to bring peace and healing wherever we are in the confidence that God is standing by each of us and that our trust in God will not disappoint. In confidence we trust in God's time for a liberation from the apparent evils of these times.

Reflect then on "Stand by Me" or in the earlier words of Psalm 46 verse 10, "Be still and know that I am God"

We can stand by the psalmist. As in Psalm 46 calls us into a conversation with such theological conundrums. Stand by the psalmist's call to stand by God, to desist from military action and wait on God. To desist from harming the planet and wait Go on God. To stand by one another and wait on God. "Be still", to stop "and know that I am God" and wait on God.

When, in the future I play the opening triad of notes on my bass guitar of the song Stand by Me by Ben E King, I will hear again all God in Psalm 46; stand by my brothers and sisters, and wait on God. For I know God stands by me.

# Resumé of Church meeting held on September 14th 2022

Minutes of the last Church Meeting held on 21<sup>st</sup> June 2022 having been circulated were agreed and signed.

**Matter Arising – Organist –** We are looking forward to Suh Young Lee being with us. She will come on Sunday morning 18<sup>th</sup> September when Judith Flint will be playing so that she can begin to understand how our services proceed. Suh Young will play the organ for the first time on 25<sup>th</sup> September which is our Harvest-.

**Youth Worker -** Brenda Kelly had mentioned to our Minister that Carys Kelly would be interested in this post. Following her application for this Moira Fleming and the Minister will meet with her to discuss the post.

Charity Giving – Talking Through Art – Our Minister showed a video of this work in Kigali, Rwanda which helps people with disabilities to make craft items to sell. St Andrews Balham URC have been supporting this project but were unable to continue. The Chairman had been in contact with Petr Kocnar, the organiser Previously, Balham had sent £300 per quarter to this charity. The members recommended that we send £400 from September and commit to 1 year's giving.

It was decided to hold Gift Day on 12<sup>th</sup> November and hold a Coffee Morning to raise funds for this project. The Members will be shown the video at the morning service on 30<sup>th</sup> October.

**Churches Together in Surbiton** - Barbara Smith had attended the AGM of CTS on our behalf having taken over from Cynthia Stock. Thanks were expressed to Cynthia.

**Financial Report –** We have received a letter of thanks for our donation to Christian Aid. The Treasurer suggested that we hold a retiring collection for the Pakistan Floods Appeal. It was agreed that this would be held on 2<sup>nd</sup> October.

Our Ministry & Mission Contribution for 2023 will be the same as this year £17004.

**Vestry Toilet** – This has been redecorated at a cost of £400.

The treasurer has obtained fixed prices for Gas and electricity until 2024/5. During the pandemic we have used Free Conference Calls to stream our services. We now have to pay £50 shared between Tolworth & Ewell Churches.

**Pastoral Supervision** – All Ministers are now required to receive professional Pastoral Supervision . The cost of this for Our Minister will again be shared with Ewell URC.

**Student – Yonas Beyene –** This student of the Congregational Federation required a placement for 10 hours a week for 1 year. The minister agreed to help with this training.

## Tales from our campground: smoke and fire

As the days get shorter and cooler the need for a fire at camp increases. In fact, by October, camp and fire are as inseparable as bread and jam. At this time of year fire is far more than a

source of heat and a means of cooking. Its crackles speak as part of the woods' voice. Flames pierce the darkness. Vivid colours paint mesmerising pictures. Camp TV at its best. The one thing you don't need is smoke.

There are reasons why you may need a smoky fire. Sending distress signals. Chasing away biting insects. Smoking something for dinner. Although come to think of it, none of the wardens ever came to investigate our smoke signals...

We didn't actually set out to make a smoky fire. We prefer chemical insect repellent and our cooking (camp or otherwise) hasn't reached the sophistication of smoking something for dinner. Our campsite provides the new "ready to burn" wood that has been dried to regulatory specification in order to eliminate smoke. Excellent. However, nothing in the regulations requires wood suppliers to keep

However, nothing in the regulations requires wood suppliers to keep the dried wood dry once it comes out of the kiln. And so it was that a delivery of 'dried' wood arrived at the campsite extremely wet from apparently unexpected heavy downpours. Hmmm. This is England. It rains.

The fire smoked. And smoked some more. We used all the bushcraft tricks we know but every fire we lit that week would have done the Arbroath Smokies proud. Still, we kept ourselves (mostly) warm, (fairly) dry and (definitely) fed. We even learned much in the process, although possibly it wasn't quite the intended meaning of coming unscathed through Isaiah's "fiery trials" – as the hymn puts it.
