The greatest story ever told...

Now among those that went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir we wish to see Jesus". John 12: 20-23

Now, I do not think these Greeks were particularly interested in seeing what Jesus looked like, or what he was wearing or how he kept his hair. You would probably think they wanted to meet with and engage this wonderful man. Much less were they inviting Philip to draw a picture or make a movie of Jesus so they could see what he looked like.

In the last couple of months, Martin Scorsese, one of the world's greatest film directors has disclosed that he is to make another film about Jesus. At a different kind of festival, The Global Aesthetics of Catholic Imagination, Scorsese said that he was moved by an appeal from the Pope "in the only way I know how...by imagining and writing a screenplay about Jesus".

Scorsese, attending the conference was explaining how "the Holy Father's appeal to **let us see Jesus'** moved him".

Our brothers and sisters in faith in Islamic tradition do not consider it appropriate to depict any biblically revered figures in film or fresco. Maybe for good reason. Perhaps it is not always helpful to our faith to see Jesus as the blue eyed, blonde man, with trimmed beard and dressed in immaculate white as he is so often portrayed. Maybe we should simply see Jesus in our own minds eye. Perhaps this would better represent and reflect all cultures and ethnicities. It is worth a thought.

However there have been a multitude of such films over the years. This made me wonder about asking you to contribute to next month's CONCORD magazine by sharing your favourite depiction of Jesus on the big screen and why it moved you.

The last cinema trip I made made to see a film depicting Jesus was the 2018 Mary Magdalene staring Rooney Mara as Mary and Joaquin Phoenix as Jesus. Mary alongside other women were portrayed as every part the disciples of Jesus as the twelve apostles are in the gospels. As a teenage boy I was moved by Franco Zeffirelli's TV epic Jesus of Nazareth in 1977 with Robert Powell as Jesus. I was influenced by the Jesus of Gospel and Jesus Christ superstar on stage, but the films were terrible.

But the one film, which was for me the masterpiece was by Martin Scorsese in 1988. The Last temptation of Christ staring William Defoe. It was banned by many religious groups. It was misunderstood. The opening scenes are of the boy Jesus and his father working in the carpenter's shop making crosses of torture for the Romans. Obviously, not based in biblical fact but a tremendous connection with Jesus, freely giving is own life for the world and making his own cross of suffering and death to do it. The film centres on the almost the last

moment of Jesus earthly life, when on the cross he cries out, ""Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, My God, my God why have you forsaken me?" Matthew 27;46. The picture asks the question of that very moment. What might have happened if Jesus had not fulfilled what God had asked of him? What might have happened if Jesus had followed his own human desires? What would have happened if Jesus had felt this abandonment of God before and followed his own human path? What would have happened if Jesus had failed? I remember asking this same question as a young teenage Christian in church youth club!

We give thanks to God that Jesus was faithful to the end. Martin Scorsese stays faithful to Christ in his film. Yet it was an honest portrayal of a very human moment.

So for us films and re-telling the stories from a different perspective can be helpful, encouraging and help us reflect on Jesus life in new ways.

There is a story, perhaps apocryphal, in the epic 1960s The Greatest Story Ever told. At the crucifixion scene, John Wayne a Centurion soldier utters the words, "Surely this was the Son of God". In rehearsals, the director George Stevens shouts to John Wayne, "say it with awe". And so John Wayne, repeats his line, "Aw! Surely this was the son of God!"

Tales from the camp ground 10: Fire lighting

There are around 500 references to fire throughout the Bible. It is often used as a symbol of God's presence, ranging from a demonstration of God's power on Mount Horeb with Elijah and the prophets of Baal to the coming of the Holy Spirit after Jesus' ascension.

Actually, I feel more sympathy with the prophets of Baal and their difficulties in lighting their fire than I should probably admit. We are improving but there are many times when the wood and weather conditions definitely feel like they are conspiring against you. We have experimented with a variety of methods of starting a fire at camp – legally that is, in a proper firepit and with all appropriate precautions observed. We are not pyromaniacs, I promise.

We are comforted by the advice from one expert who says that if you need a quart of petrol and a flamethrower to light the wretched thing then so be it. We have never tried that particular method, largely because we want a fire to cook supper not create a blaze worthy of Bonfire Night. If pushed, and we have an hour – or two – spare, we can strike a spark with the ferro rod buried at the bottom of our fire kit. If we're in a hurry, then yes, we do use BBQ-style firelighters but I dislike carrying them because the smell permeates the entire rucksack. We have made our own firestarters by dipping cotton pads in melted wax. These work surprisingly well. They are also waterproof and very easy to carry. Our current favourites, though, are eco lighters made from potato stalks. These burn for ages and, so far, have been failsafe in starting our fire.







We're keen to try some of other methods that the Warden showed us last month. These include charcloth and flint and the King Alfred's cakes that are found on deciduous deadwood and that burn very impressively. However, we might leave the glycerine and permanganate option to school chemistry labs. God's presence in fire doesn't need that kind of chemical help.
