From our Minister

Dear Friends,

November 2023

Are you going to get lost in Disney over Christmas? Do you think you will encounter the story or song of a Disney production during the Christmas season. Either for ourselves, with children or grandchildren, or with our parents, most of us will I expect! Well, among all the anniversaries we have celebrated these past couple of years. Here is another one. In October, Disney celebrated their 100th Anniversary.

When Ashley our son was almost six years old, he got lost in Disney, literary! We visited Disney Paris, and, in the crowds, he wondered off. Terrifying for parents! A parent's worst nightmare. But what joy there was when we found him in the Children's lost and found room, watching Mickey Mouse...in French. I guess he was also lost in the Disney story.

This is what I meant by "lost" of course. Lost in the delight and the magic of a Disney film or song.

One hundred years ago two brothers (Walt and Roy) began animating in a small room in Chicago. Moving to Hollywood in 1923 to start the company they created Disney. In 1928 Walt Disney gave us the friendly, ever helpful, all smiling character of Mickey Mouse in Steamboat Willie. In 1937, against all advice Disney produced the first ever full-length animated film, Snow White and the seven Dwarfs. Then another barrier is broken, when real life actors act and dance alongside animated characters in Mary Poppins in 1964. This multibillion-dollar conglomerate has been making films and braking cinematic barriers ever since.

The films have been more than entertainment. They have displayed the great religious values and virtues. Honesty and integrity are rewarded. Grace and mercy elevated. The small and outcast are heroes. The beast finds love. Our outward appearance is less important than our inner selves. Love triumphs over hate. And children learn to face and manage the terrors of life in a safe environment. There are shadows and pain. The films and stories help us all to know that we can work through such times and all can be well.

Although Disney reflects many of the values, and moral instruction, of our faith you will not find one explicit mention of organised religion, faith or God in the films themselves. Perhaps this is good business sense. It means the productions are universal and can be exported to all countries and cultures. As indeed they have. Or as Disney themselves would have it, it is because they do not want to be seen to favour any one religion and or faith. All are equal as far as film making and storytelling is concerned.

That said, Walt Disney himself grew up as a sincere and committed Congregationalist. His father was a strict non-conformist deacon and preacher and, in some accounts, it is said that this turned Walt off religion. But Walt Disney's own words do not suggest this. The optimism and Calvinist model of the Protestant work ethic is clearly visible in his life. He espoused the fruits of faith, and the Congregationalist teaching he received and considered that faith is to be lived out in a holy and good life. "Deeds rather than words". Then there is the often-quoted words of Walt Disney, "Whatever success I have had...I attribute in great part to my Congregational upbringing and my lifelong habit of prayer."

So, as we approach Christmas in Disney's 100th year, and enjoy a good Disney film you might like to reflect a little on the values and aspects of faith in the story. Or you may just get lost in the magic. Either way it will touch your lives and living.

Resumé of Tolworth Church Meeting held on 1st October 2023

Present: Revd Roger Jones (Chair), Moira Fleming (Secretary), plus 19 members and friends.

Matters arising from last meeting on 16th July

- Organist:
 - Young is very likely to move to Kingston URC as they can support accommodation. Roger will negotiate with Kingston to see if Young can be shared with Tolworth, possibly on alternate Sundays, until a successor is found.

Financial report:

Ministry and Mission contribution: This will rise to £18708 from 1 January 2024, with £1559 payable each month. Church meeting approved this payment.

1. Gift day:

- Funds remaining from Gift Day 2022 amount to £7245. Church meeting agreed
 this should be used to pay for maintenance and the commitment to Rwanda of
 £1200. Further funds remaining could be used to make the six charitable
 donations of £100 each.
- Gift Day 2023: **4 November**. Coffee & cake and a raffle will be provided during the morning.
- 2. Youth worker: Church meeting approved the request to apply to Synod for the second instalment of £5000 to cover year 2 of the youth worker.
- 3. An auditor is still needed to approve church accounts. Barbara will ask Gary if this is something he could undertake.

Christmas:

- The church will be decorated on 2 December with candles as the theme. Each window will have a different colour and be decorated with three candles. .
- The tree lighting service will be at 4:00pm on 3 December and followed by light refreshments.
- There will be an afternoon Christingle Service for Messy Church on 21 December.
- There is scope to reinstate an evening carol service. This year it will be incorporated
 into the Evergreen service that will be taking place on 17 December and will be a
 community carol service with local households invited to nominate their favourite
 carols, out of which the top ten carols will be chosen. An earlier start of 5:30 was
 agreed. Mincepies and coffee will be served afterwards..

Church strategy:

• The strategy has the following six themes (items underneath have not yet been delivered, items in italics are additional suggestions)

1. Being outward-facing.

- Coffee mornings.
- Community hymns of praise: assess following the community carol service.
- Twinning with other churches: this could be part of supporting Rwanda.

2. Seeking to find out what God wants.

- Bible study: Following on from the notice in Concord, Roger will put up a rota during October inviting people to indicate if they are interested in attending, hosting, or leading a bible study on a monthly basis. This could start with an Advent-themed course of study.
- Prayer meetings: anyone is welcome to offer to host a prayer meeting.

3. Facing the cost of change.

- Eco church: Kingston Borough Council has agreed to undertake a free energy audit of church premises with the aim of reducing energy bills. This is being set up with Dave and Julie and will result in a report giving recommendations. Heather, Barbara and Gillian will look at how to take this forward and achieve Tolworth's Eco-church rating.
- Sanctuary changes (lighting).

- 4. Operating as a community.
- 5. Being inclusive.
 - Tolworth's policy on same sex marriages.
 - Child-friendly church: Carys is working on a new children and youth friendly church scheme.
- 6. Doing a few things well.
- Roger will update the strategic plan and email it to those in the church who are online. A
 hard-copy will be sent to those without access to email.

Any other business:

Visionary Companion: The URC has begun a new system when a Church has a
vacancy for a minister. Prior to an interim moderator, churches are asked to appoint a
visionary companion to plan the vision and future life of the church. Training is
available. See Roger for details.

Date of next meeting: 19 November 2023 at 12noon in Elgar Hall.

The meeting closed by sharing the Grace together.

News From The Ukraine

Our granddaughter, Isabel, works in Kiev in the Ukraine for a Norwegian aid agency, which tries to care for vulnerable people who are displaced from their home towns because of the Russian attacks. It was interesting to talk to her, and hear about her work. She said that at the moment most of the Russian bombing of Kiev is ineffective because of Ukraine's efficient anti-aircraft defences, but falling shrapnel is still a grave danger. When there are raids people are advised to go into underground shelters, or position themselves between two walls – I think she meant in corners. She says Kiev is still a beautiful city, and she showed us pictures of parks and elegant buildings, and the enchanting view from her balcony. She was full of praise for the spirit of the Ukrainian people she meets, who manage somehow to remain positive during these terrible times. She told us how surprised she was to meet up with agency workers she had first known in other postings - in Jordan, South Sudan and Sierra Leone. The world is so lucky that people like Isabel feel drawn to go to dangerous places to do their best to help the innocent victims of wars and unjust governments. It would be lovely if friends in our two churches would remember Isabel in their prayers - she is always in ours.
