

From our Minister

Dear Friends, March 2024

Why is there a war?... "Because I and my neighbour and everyone else do not have enough love. Yet we could fight war and all its excrescences by releasing, each day, the love that is shackled inside us, and giving it a chance to live". —Etty Hillesum

Etty Hillesum, the writer of the above quote, was twenty-nine years old when she died in Auschwitz.

This magazine letter is being written as the armies of Israel stand, progressing the war with Hamas and on the verge of attacking Rafa, in Gaza. The million plus people, mostly innocent families having sought refuge there at the beginning of the war in the Middle East.

This letter is being written as the British parliament have experienced a melt-down over arguments about how to vote on three different propositions on how to bring some peace or ceasing of conflict and releases to Israeli hostages and Palestine prisoners.

I know it is complicated. We can see the self-interest alongside genuine attempts to cease atrocities. But how?

In the light of what is happening in Gaza, and Ukraine, as well as in other parts of the world, I just wanted to make a call for our on-line lent studies this year.

We are again using material from Embrace, a charity working in the Middle East that seeks to bring reconciliation between the Israeli and Palestinian people in the Middle East as well as partnering with many groups to improve the lives of individuals and families.

The bible study material is called Healing and Hope in the One Household of God. The sessions do not focus on war, or the conflict in the Middle East. In these sessions we are not having discussions about war and conflict. They are reflections on healing and Hope. But using the material created from people working does have some poignancy.

Our first session considered the crossing of the Red Sea by the Israelites escaping the horrors of slavery and achieving their own freedom, hope and healing. Whilst the crossing of the Red Sea is a great staple diet in Sunday school, this is a troubling story. Factual or not, the truth is that achieving such healing and hope is hard fought and hard won. Factual or not the truth is that God is on the side of healing and Hope. Factual or not God will be victorious. We are struck by the way that God gently nudges people to think about their preconceptions they hold about themselves and others. Even in this dramatic story.

As we witness these horrors around the world, and feel helpless, these bible studies during lent will help consider where we can bring healing. The sessions will give us opportunities to see hope. They will be opportunities to pray for peace. Hope and healing are hard fought and hard won. But God remains with us in our efforts, failures and successes.

Beating swords in to plough shares, the work of making peace, as described in the bible, is hard won work, a victory in itself. Its practical wisdom of the New Testament that says the blessing of God falls on those who make peace; not those who wish for peace, or hope for peace or talk about the importance of peace.

The lent studies written and prepared by people experiencing conflict can inspire us not just to talk or wish! In our small way maybe we seek to help each other be peacemakers.

Dear Friends,

Further to the discussions and planning for the ministry and mission for the church and numerous meetings, to plan a strategy, and property meetings to consider buildings, I am pleased to say that some actual construction work on the buildings will begin at the church on Monday 19th February 2024.

This first phase will be to re-roof the flat roofs over the offices, circulating areas and passageway, the Mary Wallace prayer room, and the meeting rooms and to re-tile the sanctuary pitched roof and add insulation across this whole area.

As well as securing and protecting the property from the elements this will make for a warmer venue and considerably easier and cheaper to heat. Most importantly this will be a significant improvement of our carbon footprint and so help to look after Gods world. Hurrah!

The work is expected to take thirteen weeks with minimal disruption. However, it may be that for three of these weeks we will need to worship in the halls.

The scaffolding has now been erected and this does mean that parking is restricted. You may need to find spaces on the road whilst the work on the roof is being completed. Please also note that the building is a bit more vulnerable to theft or break-ins. Scaffolding can be inviting to thieves who think the building is empty. So be careful with your property and what you leave on the premises.

However, the beginning of work on the building is good news. Please await further information and plans for the internal improvements over the coming months.

We can continue in our prayers for the development and for ourselves. We pray for patience and grace during all this activity.

Tolworth Secretary's Report for 2023

2023 was the 90th Anniversary year for Tolworth United Reformed Church.

Our membership is not what it was in 1933 but it is growing and at present we have 33 members and about 20 friends who attend regularly or when they can. We also have about 5 children who come on a Sunday for Junior Church. We now have a Youth Leader in Carys Kelly who runs Junior Church and helps organise Pilots and Messy Church. These two organisations are thriving and Carys has developed a really good relationship with the young people.

We had five baptisms and one wedding in 2023 and we were very pleased to welcome Annabel and Alvin Lam and their family into membership of our Church family.

At Easter time we had our usual joint communion service with Surbiton Hill Methodist Church on Maundy Thursday and Roger led the service there on Good Friday morning. Roger led an on line Lent Study Course, helped by Barbara Pearson which was attended by members and friends from Ewell and Tolworth. Easter Sunday we were back at Tolworth for our Easter Day Communion service.

Preparations then began for our 90th Anniversary. Our Anniversary Weekend began with an exhibition of memorabilia including many photos taken throughout the years and historical items such as Cradle Rolls, Membership Roll books etc. We all had our handprints taken by Gillian which were then painted and cut out and Austin painted a tree which we had blown up in size and put on a big banner to which all our hand prints were attached to the branches as leaves. The children of Playtime, Kids United, Pilots and Messy Church were also involved. The Banner was hung on the pulpit for a few weeks and was greatly admired. It now has a permanent place in the Church. Thank you to everyone whose hard work contributed to our celebrations. Sadly not as many people as we hoped came along to the exhibition but it was good to see some old friends there. We concluded the weekend with an Anniversary Communion service followed by lunch.

At the end of October, our lovely Korean organist, Young, moved to Kingston URC where they had more work for her and paid more. However, we came to an arrangement with Kingston that she will play for us once a month and perhaps more later next year.

We had a successful Harvest service when the Church was beautifully decorated and the food contributed was given to the Food Bank..

Soon it was Advent and Christmas. Daryl Knight had suggested decorating round the Church windows with lights. This proved very successful. Our theme for the season was "The Light of the World" so several members decorated hand made cardboard candles made by Gillian. These were put in all the windows and a huge map of the world with the caption "Jesus Christ the Light of the World" was suspended from the pulpit. We started our Advent worship with the Tree Lighting Service (in spite of the rain!) then we all held candles and lit one from the other until all were alight. Our Carol Service was the highlight of the season. We leafleted the surrounding area inviting people to come and about 100 people attended. We were pleased to have the Bell Ringers playing carols at the service and were delighted to have Judith Flint play the organ for us. It was a memorable evening. On Christmas morning Roger led the first half of our service before going to Ewell to continue with the service. Heather then continued with our service. Thank you to both of them..

It has been a busy year, but a successful one. It is encouraging to see new people coming to our services and better still, returning. Thank you to everyone who helps in all sorts of ways. Our eldership has been somewhat beset by illness in the past year but we still carry on doing what we can. It is good to see some of our new friends helping at coffee times and reading at services. Our catering team work hard for various events and as Cynthia has felt unable to continue with the flower rota, we are grateful to Brenda and her helpers for taking over this task.

Our Halls lettings have gradually perked up since the Covid Lockdown and we now also let out the sanctuary for some events. All these lettings help provide a big part of our income and we are grateful to Sid Heath for organising them.

Thank you to all who help keep our church going, our Elders, Management team, Youth Worker to mention but a few. Our greatest thanks goes to our Minister, Roger, for his encouragement, enthusiasm and hard work and also to his wife, Gillian, for all she does with Pilots, Messy Church and controlling the laptop at services.

Tales from the campground 17: Mending holes

There is, I believe, an army quote which goes: "proper preparation prevents poor performance," or words to that effect. We are preparing our kit for the new camping season and started by repairing my inflatable pillow in the hope that it will last another year. It

In desperation I tried a piece on the pillow grinning at us from the bath. No wonder my skin doesn't like it. The tape stuck and stayed stuck. In fact, we had to prise it off once the pillow had dried so that we could make the proper repair using the tape that's supposed to fix everything from bouncy castles to kayaks.

Sadly the wretched thing still seems to be leaking air. Just not as quickly. Back to the bath it will have to go.

Mending an invisible hole has become a relationship-testing, patience-trying job. I'm trying to decide who's performing poorly here – us or the pillow. How it acquired pinprick holes in the first place is, of course, another story....
